Beverly Cleary Young Reader's Room Ribbon Cutting and Birthday Bash

Briana Ochoa, Supervising Librarian presented:

Background:

In July 2022, an Ontario resident submitted a naming request form to the Library Board to request that the City Council of Ontario name the Ovitt Family Community Library children's room in honor of the children's author, Beverly Cleary. After approval from City Council, the Library Board met in September 2022 and chose the name "Beverly Cleary Young Readers Room."

On April 12, 2023, the Ontario City Library hosted a ribbon-cutting ceremony and family event for the naming of the Beverly Cleary Young Readers Room. The community was invited to watch the unveiling of the new sign and partake in activities themed after Cleary's characters. Over 100 community members were present for the event.

Ontario Museum of History & Art: Built on Water: Ontario and Inland Southern California

In 2017, the Ontario Museum of History & Art began developing a new permanent exhibition, which was inspired by efforts underway to redesign the Museum's landscaping with native plants and water-saving features. Curatorial staff realized there was a bigger story to tell about water and its importance in Ontario. The Museum was awarded a Museums for America grant from the Institute of Library and Museum Services for this new exhibit in 2018. Built on Water: Ontario and Inland Southern California focuses on the history and future of water in the Ontario region and the Chino Basin, and was developed collaboratively with local archivists, water agencies, teachers, tribal members, college students and historians. The grant funds were used to plan and implement the 1,200 square-foot exhibition, as well as create educational programming and interactive components such as a mobile app that explores the future of water management and a VR experience that follows the life of a Monarch butterfly. The Curator of Exhibits and Curator of Education will present on the four-chapter themes of the exhibit and complimentary visitor engagement activities and resources.

- 1. Where Does Water Come From?
- 2. Who Does Water Belong to?
- 3. Do we Have Enough Water?
- 4. Who are the Water Guardians?

Built on Water will have a grand opening celebration on Saturday, August 19 from 6 PM - 9 PM in conjunction with the quarterly Ontario Art Walk. Additionally, the staff invites the public to join us on Thursday, August 31 at 6 PM for a panel discussion with contributors to the exhibit's Community Voices on Water project. Participants will discuss why water is such an important aspect of living here in the Inland Empire.

Built on Water is made possible through the generous support of the Institute of Museum and Library Services and by the City of Ontario and the Ontario Municipal Utilities Company.

Board Vice President, Gina Lanthripe congratulated the Museum curators on the exhibit and asked what the size of the exhibit and Curator Matamoros explained that she did not know the exact square footage but it took up an entire gallery with content on the walls and on the floor as well.

Board Secretary Ann Lawliss commented that she could not wait for the exhibit and thanked both curators for the exhibition.

Board President Mena thanked the curators for the exhibition and commented on how it would allow her and the public to be more aware of water and where it comes from and can't wait to go to the exhibit.







Ontario Promise Corps Program Overview



The Ontario Promise Corps is a partnership program between the City of Ontario's Library & Recreation Departments, AmeriCorps, California Volunteers, and non-profit partners, the Ontario-Montclair Schools Foundation, and the Hope Through Housing Foundation. Under its umbrella, the Ontario Promise Corps operates three distinct programs, including an Early Family Literacy Program, Youth Mentoring Program, and College Access & Information Program.

Four service site locations:

- Ontario Library
- Ontario Recreation & Community Services
- Hope Though Housing Foundation
- Ontario-Montclair Schools Foundation: Promise Scholars





Ontario Promise Corps Areas of Service

Early Family Literacy

Ages: 0-5yrs



Established to address the low literacy rates among students, specifically 3rd grade students, in the Ontario-Montclair School District.

OPC seeks to address early family literacy levels through targeting both the child and caregivers.





Ontario Promise Corps Areas of Service

Youth Mentoring

Ages: 10yrs-15yrs



Established to address the socialemotional needs of middle school students who feel discouraged about their future.

OPC seeks to address these concerns by providing small-group mentoring sessions that will provide students an opportunity to gain social-emotional growth, life skills, academic and career readiness. The goal is to broaden their outlook and see that they do not have to be a product of their environment.

College Access

Ages: Middle School High School



Established to address the many barriers to success, including college access and social-emotional needs of youth in our community.

OPC seeks to address these barriers by guiding students through the challenging pathways leading to college entrance and provide college and career activities that will support the socialemotional growth of our youth.

AGENDA REPORT SUMMARY

Summer at Ontario City Library is an annual reading program hosted by the library. The program serves a twofold purpose: to foster a love for reading across all age groups and to strengthen the community's recognition of the library as a central hub. By opening the door to positive experiences, this program plays a pivotal role in enhancing literacy and educational opportunities. Moreover, it aids in mitigating learning loss among children during the summer break and contributes to stress reduction while also helping to prevent dementia and Alzheimer's in older adults.

The theme chosen for this year's Summer at Ontario City Library is "Reading, Can Ya Dig It?" and will take place June 5 – July 29, 2023. The theme, inspired by 90s nostalgia, brings a relevant marketing approach to a beloved reading program.

Participants will register for the program on Beanstack, an online platform that allows readers to log their reading and earn badges for reaching milestones, and to enter grand prize opportunity drawings using tickets that they earn for reading. Participants can visit the library in person or the Beanstack website to register. Participation boosts library engagement with the community by providing more reasons to visit the library either to pick up weekly prizes as they pick out new books to read or attending special programs.

Preparation for the summer reading program entails collaboration between library staff, local businesses, and the Friends of the Ontario City Library. Their combined efforts result in securing sponsorships for weekly and grand prizes, such as gift cards, exclusive coupons, and interactive toys designed for youth. These enticing incentives serve to amplify the program's appeal, motivating participants to actively partake in the reading experience.

Summer at Ontario City Library is promoted all summer long by staff attending outreach events and inviting the community to participate. There will be several library programs at both library locations to promote and celebrate Summer at Ontario City Library. There are kick-off events and special performances including Wonders of Wildlife and the David Skale Magic Show. Details for all programs can be found on the City of Ontario's online event calendar.

Summer at Ontario City Library stands as an enduring annual library institution that garners anticipation and enthusiasm from library patrons year after year. With its profound impact on promoting reading, community engagement, and overall well-being, this program continues to shape the cultural fabric of our community. By offering diverse incentives and fostering a love for literature, it contributes significantly to the intellectual growth and development of individuals across all age groups.



Lunch at the Library

AGENDA REPORT SUMMARY

During the school year, many children and teenagers rely on school meals as their main source of food for the day. When the school year ends, they lose access to the security and nutrition that school meals provide. Lunch at the Library is a statewide, federally funded program (United States Department of Agriculture) intended to combat childhood hunger and obesity by providing accessible, free meals to children during the summer.

Libraries are an ideal venue for hosting Lunch at the Library programs due to their role as communal gathering places. Libraries' overarching philosophy is to be a welcoming space for all, provide free access to materials and resources, and support lifelong needs. The Ovitt Family Community Library is one of 171 California

libraries providing free meals for youth this summer. Lunch at the Library is an annual summer program that began in Ontario in 2015 except for 2020 and 2021 due to the pandemic. In 2022, 2,720 meals were served to youth at the Ovitt Family Community Library.

The successful implementation of this program is made possible through the library's collaboration with the Ontario-Montclair school district. The Food and Nutrition department of the Ontario-Montclair school district undertakes the cooking, delivery, and serving of the meals, while the library staff play an integral role in promoting, coordinating, setting up, and staffing the daily meal service. Free lunch is available to youth between the ages of 1 and 18, from Monday to Friday, between 11:30 AM and 1:30 PM. The program is scheduled to operate from June 5 to July 28, 2023. On June 22, there will be a special meal service for families in celebration of Farm to Summer Week. Families are invited to a barbeque in Ontario Town Square to enjoy lawn games, hear from a local farmer, and get their faces painted. At this special Lunch at the Library service, meals will also be provided to the adults.

Through participation surveys of the 2022 Lunch at the Library program library staff learned that the community needed connections to medical and social services. To meet this need, the library has partnered with several organizations to provide an information table during the lunch service:

- Medi-Cal Dental
- San Bernardino County's Transitional Assistance Department
- City of Ontario's Housing and Homeless Services
- Reach Out
- Vision to Learn
- San Bernardino County's Department of Public Health
- San Antonio Regional Hospital

Ontario City Library's Lunch at the Library program is also supported by the California State Library. Library staff applied for and received \$4,295 in funding from the California State Library to support the program. The funding will provide children with books to build home libraries, provide hygiene kits with a toothbrush, toothpaste, body wash, shampoo, and conditioner, and hire summer performers for our barbeque event and Summer at OCL reading program.

The impact of Lunch at the Library has its ripples far beyond the lunchroom. Last year, a child expressed his gratitude for the service. He stated, "You started this program on the perfect day. This morning, we opened our pantry and saw that there was no food, so we came here to eat." This meal service provides a large, impactful service to our community that has lasting effects.

Ontario City Library is one of many locations where youth can obtain free school lunch this summer. Several Ontario community centers and school sites also offer the service.
