Library Director, Shawn Thrasher announced that former board member Daisy Macias was to be presented with a plaque for her outstanding service to the Library Board of Trustees, but she was absent. Thrasher reported that there is still space to attend *Serving with a Purpose*, an

annual conference the Ontario City Library presents with other libraries at the Ontario Convention Center for Friends of the Library, library boards, foundation boards, and library staff who work with them. Thrasher reported this year's conference will be on September 1, 2021 from 8:30am to 4pm. Thrasher stated that the conference will feature various workshops and sessions specific to board roles. Mena requested name tags. Thrasher also requested that board members relate to him their shirt size if they would like to receive an Ontario City Library shirt.

STAFF REPORT

#### KinderGo (Daisy Flores and Briana Ochoa)

Daisy Flores, Library Services Manager and Briana Ochoa, Supervising Librarian, narrated a presentation on KinderGo.

A copy of this presentation is available upon request from the Library Director.

Lawliss asked if volunteers could request which school site they visit and Ochoa replied that yes, once all schools have been scheduled, volunteers can request to visit specific scheduled school sites. Ricci asked if this program extends to special needs children and Flores responded, yes, there is a specific request made every year to include special needs kinder classrooms and children in this program. Mena asked why there isn't a program like KinderGo that targets all age groups. Flores responded that while OCL does target all age groups with literacy programs, KinderGo is specifically designed and intentionally targeting kindergarteners to get them on track early on in life to better strengthen the probability that they become lifelong readers and library users. Ricci then asked how nonverbal special needs children are being addressed and if assistive technology is being used for KinderGo. Flores responded that this program happens in the actual school classroom and that although they have not had a teacher request the library bring any special equipment, that they would attempt to accommodate non-verbal children as necessary if requested to do so.

#### Budget Review 2021-22 (Shawn Thrasher)

Shawn Thrasher, Library Director, narrated a PowerPoint presentation on the 2021-22 library budget.

A copy of this presentation is available upon request from the Library Director.

Ricci asked why the programming budget is much smaller than the staff salary budget. Thrasher responded that staff salaries are negotiated, and the library has no authority over salaries.

Thrasher went on to explain that the library has increased its programming budget every year. Helen McAlary, Executive Community Life & Culture Agency Director, commented that staff are the largest part of programming (i.e., their research, planning, ordering, approval, marketing, and execution) and that the actual budget just covers materials like construction paper. Thrasher agreed with McAlary and responded that it is quite normal for many libraries to not have a programming budget. He also pointed out that while the allocated budget appears small, it does not quite show the entire picture as librarians are continuously applying for and receiving grant money that goes towards programs. Ricci then asked if there was a way to request that certain amounts of the budget go to certain purchases. Thrasher replied that you would have to go to a city council member and make that request so that they could bring it to us. Mena commented that cost of living has gone up and salaries will have to go up and that the budget looks great. Mena also commented that the library did such a great job during the pandemic and the library has managed their money well.

#### **OLD BUSINESS**

Bylaws amendments (Staff)

1. Article V- vetting bylaws.

City Attorney advised this could be less formal and the Library Board can discuss among its members and vote on a motion to vote for amendments without being limited by a specific timeframe.

Inconsequential changes to the bylaws that do not require advanced vetting by legal counsel and/or City staff, such as scheduling dates, times, and locations of meetings, may be introduces and adopted at the same meeting, provided that revisions to the bylaws was included on the agenda for that meeting."

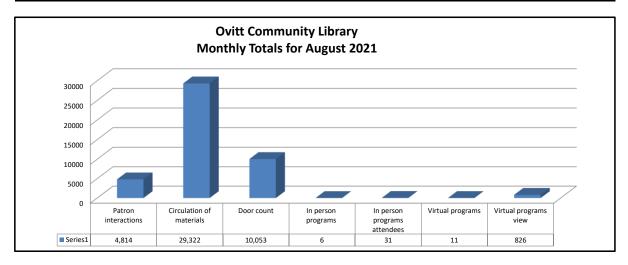

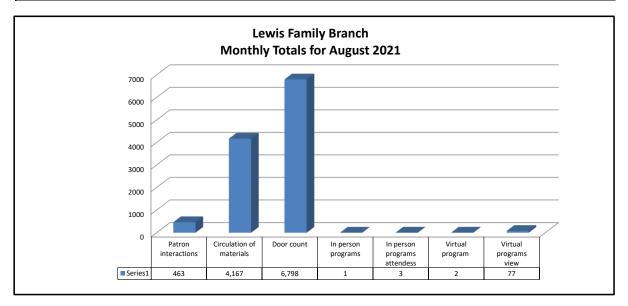

Overview of the Robert E. Ellingwood Model Colony History Room

#### **AGENDA REPORT SUMMARY**

Ontario residents established a community library in 1885. The city of Ontario incorporated in 1891, and in 1894 the library became a city department. Three librarians: Kezzie Monroe, Isabel Neales, and Alberta Schaefer were instrumental in the library's collection of local history materials during the library's early years. By the 1950s, the local history collection had grown into a few filing cabinets, and by the late 1960s, it was clear that more space was needed to collect materials. When the library expanded in 1969, an addition to the library provided space for a dedicated history room, and the Model Colony History Room was established in March 1970.

Former library director Alberta Schaefer was named administrator of the history room, and although she retired in 1972, the history room continued to flourish. Over the next decades, more and more materials were added, primarily through donations from the community. Several area residents have been proponents of the library's history collection, including former mayor Robert Ellingwood. The city recognized his tireless efforts in preserving and promoting local history by renaming the room in his honor in 2004. It is now known as the Robert E. Ellingwood Model Colony History Room.

The room contains thousands of items including:

- Photographs and negatives
- Local city directories
- Maps and aerial photographs
- Newspapers on microfilm
- Books on the local area, local people, and general Californiana
- Magazines and journals relating to the local area and California
- Oral history recordings
- Video and film recordings
- Census records
- Architectural surveys of local homes and industrial buildings
- Municipal documents such as specific plans, general plans, and environmental impact reports
- Clipping and ephemera files
- Manuscript collections (collections of records created by one entity or person)
- Yearbooks from local schools

And much more. Its most current projects focus on providing digital access to local history materials to broaden the room's reach and amplify the discovery of the collections. The library partnered with Claremont Colleges Libraries and five other institutions to share the history room's water-related documents and photographs within their California Water Documents collection, which was funded by the Council of Library & Information Resources through a 3-year \$333,000 grant. The library also partnered with the California Preservation Program (now administered by the California State Library) in multi-year grant-funded project called California Revealed, which digitized the history room's audio and visual recordings including oral histories, film footage of the local area and other California localities, interviews with prominent residents and businesspeople, and film footage from Ontario Motor Speedway. These

recordings are available online at the Internet Archive, Calisphere, and the Digital Public Library of America. The history room also has its own digital platform called Ontario Treasures, where various materials such as photographs, postcards, fruit crate labels, architectural surveys, scrapbooks, ephemera, and more are shared online. Several years ago, a database was built "in-house" to index the local Ontario newspaper, which is a great resource for genealogists and collection guides to the history room's manuscript collections are shared on the Online Archive of California. In addition to digital projects, history room staff also concentrate on preservation and archiving projects to ensure that materials will stand the test of time and will be accessible to the public for the decades to come.

The Model Colony History Room has a broad reach, assisting patrons not only from the local area but also Canada to Australia to the Netherlands and beyond. Patrons consist of K-12 students, doctoral candidates, architectural historians, genealogists, city staff, city residents, and history buffs. Many patrons also are donors, and the history room is always accepting donations of local history materials.

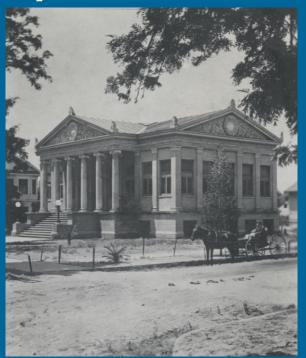
The history room is open Monday – Friday and is staffed by Patricia Edwards, full-time senior library assistant, Olivia Vallejo, part-time library assistant, and Kathleen Taggart, part-time library page. The history room has additional help from volunteers and work study students, and the room is overseen by Kelly Zackmann, Library Services Manager, who is also a certified archivist.

#### **SUBJECT**

Overview of the Patron Services Department.

#### **AGENDA REPORT SUMMARY**

The Patron Services unit in the Ovitt Family Community Library is responsible for the circulation of materials and management of all library card accounts. The team facilitates library material check out, fulfills holds by retrieving items from the shelves, sends notices about borrowed materials and is often the first point of contact for all library visitors.

During the pandemic, the library initialized a walk-up service, Check out, Ontario! for the community to have access to library materials during the facility closure or limited open hours. Patrons could visit the online catalog or call the

library to request items to be placed on hold. Once the holds were filled, patrons were notified and could visit *Check Out, Ontario!* to pick up their items. During its operation, Patron Services assisted over 5,000 community members, checking out over 160,000 materials from May 2020 to May 2021.

Another Patron Services responsibility is the recovery of lost materials. This is a new service that replaced a third-party company that managed accounts submitted to collections. The decision to replace the third-party company with an internal service created savings in professional services and permitted a new approach with customer service in mind. The internal Material Recovery Team drafted notices with more customer-friendly language. For example, "collecting a balance" was reworded to "recovery of materials". Since the inception of material recovery, nearly 2,000 materials valued at \$46,000 have been recovered. Patrons unable to locate the library materials have also been reconciling those fees, over \$110,000 has been collected since July of 2020.

Patron Services celebrates the month of September as National Library Card Sign Up Month. It is a month to encourage communities to sign up for library cards. This is the second year Patron Services will be hosting passive programming for new library card account holders. Staff will also conduct outreach through partnerships with local businesses and community centers. At the outreach events, staff will sign up visitors for library cards and provide information about the library.

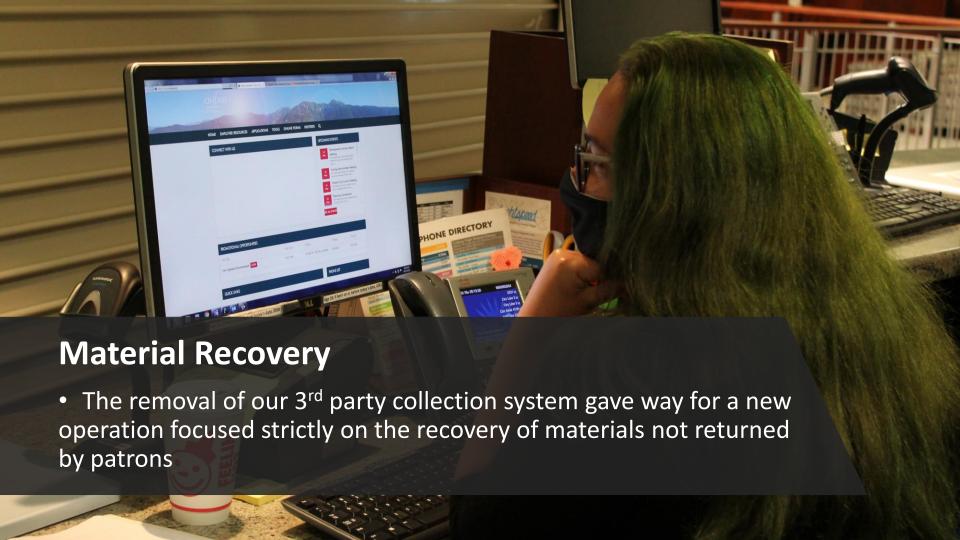
