Regular meetings of the Ontario City Council/Ontario Housing Authority/Successor Agency to the Ontario Redevelopment Agency were held on Tuesday, March 21, 2017 at the Ontario City Hall, 303 East B Street, Ontario, California.

CALL TO ORDER - OPEN SESSION

Mayor Leon called the City Council/Housing Authority/Successor Agency to the Ontario Redevelopment Agency meetings to order at 6:32 p.m., and requested the City Clerk call the roll.

Also present were City Manager/Executive Director Al C. Boling, City Attorney/Legal Counsel John Brown and City Clerk/Secretary Sheila Mautz.

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Council Member Valencia.

Assistant Pastor Dan Gross, Montecito Baptist Church provided the Invocation.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Michael Krouse, President and CEO of the Visitors Bureau/Ontario Convention Center spoke about events that will be held at Ontario Town Square: concerts on Wednesdays and movies on Fridays May 31, 2017 through August 18, 2017. Route 66 Cruisin Reunion will be held in September. He provided updates about the Convention Center: Café Connect is now open, it replaced the café that was at the center of the building and has received positive feedback. He stated that the change in location and aesthetics of the café have shown an increase of \$2,000 in sales per event. He spoke about the AMGEN Tour, Stage 5 that that the City is hosting at the Convention Center which is scheduled to take place May 18, 2017. Visit California presents Global Ready May 10, 2017, hosted at the Convention Center and is open to everyone. Comic Revolution will be hosted at the Convention Center on May 13, 2017 with 6,000 expected to attend the convention, the first of its kind in the Inland Empire. Mother's Day Brunch will take place at the Ontario Convention Center on May 14, 2017. He noted an increase in hotel occupancy with an average of 8% growth last year, and current 5% growth this year in the first few months of the year with anticipation of continued growth. Tourism week starts May 7, 2017,

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California Welcome Center will celebrate its first anniversary at the same time. The California Welcome Center has served approximately 26,000 visitors each month with visitors from Peru, Italy, Spain, Germany, Sweden, Australia, Canada, Brazil, China among those who have been through the Center. He introduced the new General Manager for the Citizens Business Bank Arena Ryan Northcott.

Ryan Northcott, General Manager of Citizens Business Bank Arena provided a brief introduction of himself. He spoke about the importance of engaging promoters and bringing concerts to the Arena. He spoke about Live Nation, and the upcoming Def Leppard concert, noting ticket sales are doing great. He also spoke about the relationship he is building with Live Nation which is anticipated to bring A-list shows. He also spoke about his engagement with AEG Live and independent promoters. He commented on the digital billboard as an asset to the Citizens Business Bank Arena and expressed his optimism for the upcoming year.

Peggi Hazlett, President/CEO of Ontario Chamber of Commerce spoke about the fifth installment of the Distribution, Logistic, and Manufacturing Roundtables taking place March 30th. Roundtable discussions that will take place include introduction of key stake holders such as Dr. Wolfe, from San Bernardino County Transportation Authority, a representative from AQMD who will talk about the new Air Quality Plan, for work force Development, Business Service Development James Johnson along with representatives from the Chamber and the City of Ontario. Good Morning Ontario will take place April 5, 2017 at 7:30 a.m. at the Airport Hotel and Conference Center. The speaker will be Dan Adamus, the Chief Marketing Officer from the Ontario International Airport. She announced the 2017 Police Recognition Luncheon that will take place May 9, 2017 at 11:30 a.m. For those interested, visit the Chamber of Commerce website or call (909) 984-2458. She thanked the title sponsor Mark Christopher Auto Center and the presenting sponsor the Ontario Convention Center which is where the event will be held.

Heidi Chancey spoke about her disappointment but understanding regarding the removal of the diseased trees along Euclid Avenue and suggested the City would hold a tree dedication ceremony to help the residents heal from the loss of the trees and bring the community together.

3. LICENSE AGREEMENT FOR USE OF A MULTI-PURPOSE TRAIL IN THE EDENGLEN SPECIFIC PLAN AREA

City Council approved a license agreement between the City and Southern California Edison (SCE) for use of the multi-purpose trail in SCE property within the Edenglen Specific Plan area; and authorized the City Manager to execute said agreement, related documents and future renewals.

4. CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT FOR THE REPLACEMENT AND INSTALLATION OF TREMCO ROOF SYSTEM AT ONTARIO POLICE DEPARTMENT ANNEX/STONE ROOFING COMPANY CORPORATION

City Council awarded Contract No. MS 1617-3 to Stone Roofing Company Corporation, of Azusa, California, for the replacement and installation of a new Tremco Roof System at Ontario Police Department Annex in the amount of \$141,380 plus a 15% contingency (\$21,207) for a total amount of \$162,587; authorized the City Manager to execute said contract, and authorized the filing of the notice of completion at the conclusion of all construction activities related to the project.

5. PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENTS FOR NETWORK OPERATIONS SUPPORT SERVICES AND ENGINEERING SUPPORT SERVICES FOR THE CITY'S FIBER OPTIC NETWORK/RON IVIE/IM SERVICES GROUP LLC

City Council authorized the City Manager to execute three-year professional services agreements with:

- (A) Ron Ivie, consultant, of Boise, Idaho, for network operations support consulting services, in an amount estimated to be \$480,000 (Four Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars) for the term of the agreement; and
- (B) IM Services Group, LLC of Boise, Idaho, for engineering support services, in an amount estimated to be \$450,000 (Four Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars) for the term of the agreement; and

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- (C) Authorized the City Manager to extend each agreement for up to two additional years in amounts consistent with the terms and conditions of the original term and at an annual average of \$160,000 and \$150,000 respectively, contingent on City Council approved budgets.
- 6. AN ORDINANCE TO CHANGE THE ZONING DESIGNATIONS (FILE NO. City Council considered and adopted an ordinance approving a Zone Change (File No. PZC16-004) to create consistency between the zoning and the General Plan land use designations of the subject properties.

City Council adopted a resolution approving a Billboard Relocation Agreement between the City of Ontario, San Bernardino County Transportation Authority, and Lamar Central Outdoor, LLC, and authorizing the City Manager to execute the agreement and any other documents necessary to fulfill the terms of the agreement.

City Council approved the plans and specifications and awarded Contract No. UT 1617-01 to Baker Electric, Inc. of Escondido, California for the design and construction of Well Facility Backup Power Upgrades at Well Nos. 24, 25, 30, 35, & 36 in the amount of \$332,747, plus a 15% contingency of \$49,912, for a total amount of \$382,659; and authorized the City Manager to execute said contract and file a notice of completion at the conclusion of all construction activities related to the project.

9. A RESOLUTION APPROVING AN APPLICATION FOR FISCAL YEAR 2016-17 HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE GRANT (HD29) FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF RESOURCES RECYCLING AND RECOVERY (CALRECYCLE)

City Council adopted a resolution approving the City's application for the Fiscal Year 2016-2017 Household Hazardous Waste Grant pursuant to Public Resources Code Sections 40000 et seq. and authorized the City Manager to execute said application.

City Council took the following actions:

Notice of public hearing was duly given and affidavits of compliance are on file in the Records Management Department.

There was no written communications on file in the Records Management Department.

Mayor Leon opened the public hearing.

Derek Barbour with Brookfield Residential thanked staff for their hard work and working with the developers in the Ontario Ranch Community.

Hearing no further requests to speak, Mayor Leon closed the public hearing.

COUNCIL MATTERS

REPORT AND RECOMMENDATION FROM SUBCOMMITTEE AND ACTION ON CITIZEN APPOINTMENTS TO CITY COMMISSIONS

Council Member Wapner noted he and Council Member Bowman were appointed to the subcommittee for at-large positions for various City Commissions. Upon review of the applications on file, they recommended Virginia Riley to be appointed to the Parks and Recreation Commission and Bob Gregorek to the Planning Commission.

MOTION: Moved by Council Member Wapner, seconded by Mayor pro Tem Dorst-Porada and carried by unanimous vote appointing Virginia Riley to the Parks and Recreation Commission and Bob Gregorek to the Planning Commission.

Mayor pro Tem Dorst-Porada invited the public to view the exhibits currently at the Museum by artists Sheets, Sheets and Caughman entitled Art for Living and Living for Art on display until March 26, 2017, it is open Tuesday – Friday from 12:00 p.m. – 4:00 p.m. free of charge. She spoke about the walking group she is a part of that meets Sundays at 8:00 a.m. at Town Square and was excited to share that they have been in existence now for over 8 years allowing them to develop great relationships. She also spoke about the importance of the trees in the City and stated that trees lining Euclid Avenue are part of the City's historical landmarks. She stated that over 110 pepper trees were planted in 2010; however, reforestation continues to be a problem. She emphasized that due to State mandates, the City is prohibited from watering green belts around the City. She noted difficulties in using water tank trucks to water Euclid Avenue and asked the public for their assistance to water the street trees adjacent to their properties to prevent the trees from disease and decline.

Council Member Wapner had no comments.

Council Member Bowman agreed with Mayor pro Tem Dorst-Porada regarding the importance of the trees in the City. He noted that the City has an in-house arborist who takes care of the trees in the City and stated that the City also hired an arborist consultant for a second opinion on the diseased trees. He spoke about the importance of public safety and supports the City's decision to remove the diseased trees to protect the health, safety and welfare of the City and prevent liability issues. He stated that for every tree that is removed, a new tree is planted in its place.

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Council Member Valencia spoke about a neighborhood meeting he attended in Creekside with the City's police officers who provided information regarding the issues happening in the City. He commended the Fire Department for their St. Patrick's Day Fundraiser at El Torito and urged the public to calendar next year's event. He spoke about his attendance at Coffee with Assemblyman Freddie Rodriguez at the Library and the comments made by the community regarding Caltrans and the 60 Freeway. He asked to keep the City's Police Officers in their prayers as they will be participating in the Baker to Vegas run during the weekend. He reminded the public about Margarita Mojarro, 61 years old, who passed away during her daughter's wedding because a tree branch fell on the wedding party in Whittier. He expressed his concern regarding the diseased trees on Euclid and not wanting to have the same type of incident in Ontario. He thanked the members of the public who reached out to him and expressed their concerns regarding the removal of the diseased trees on Euclid.

Mayor Leon encouraged the public to get to the doctor early, rest, and stay away from others to prevent the spread of the flu. He commented on Ms. Chancey's suggestions and encouraged the public to speak up if they have any further suggestions. He stated his frustration with the State's requirement that prevents the City from watering the green belts in the City. He reminded the public that the City is working on adding infrastructure that allows the City to water the greenbelts using recycled water. He spoke about social media contacts, and added that he would address citizens' concerns privately. He spoke about Governor Brown's responsibility for the prevention of watering green belts in the process of trying to preserve water and stated that forcing cities into unreasonable regulations and live under the "one size fits all" laws causing the City to lose many things.

Mayor Leon adjourned the meetings of the Joint Agencies at 7:08 p.m. and announced the next regular meetings on Tuesday, April 4, 2017.
