Ontario History on the Go!

History comes alive in your classroom through a docent's interpretation of artifacts, photos, and games. Learn about the founding and early history of the City of Ontario in the 1880s to early 1900s. Class sizes of approximately 20-30 students are requested per session. A school may reserve more than one session (class) per day when scheduling this outreach program.

Planning Your Visit

RESERVATIONS: The Museum offers both guided and self-guided tours. A two-week advance notice is required for all tours and outreach programs. Tours are conducted Monday through Friday, from 9 AM to 1 PM. To make a reservation, call the Curator of Education, Rebecca Horta, at (909) 395-2510 or email museumtour@ontarioca.gov from Monday through Friday (9 AM to 4 PM). If your tour request falls within our regular open hours, Thursday through Sunday, Noon to 4 PM, a reservation is still required.

PAYMENT: Admission is free but donations are greatly appreciated. Your donation supports our docent training and free public programs.

CONFIRMATIONS: The Museum will confirm your reservation via email about two weeks prior to your trip or outreach. Confirmations will include a letter, reservation form, rules of behavior, chaperone information, and an Educator Resource Packet with exhibit background and activities. Be sure to read your letter and reservation form thoroughly to confirm your tour/outreach date and time.

EDUCATOR RESOURCES: Educator Resource Packets will be emailed out two weeks prior to field trip and will include exhibit information, tips for chaperones, and helpful hints for a successful fieldtrip.

FOOD: The courtyard and surrounding grounds are available for students to eat lunch with a reservation. Food and drinks are not allowed in the Museum galleries. In the case of inclement weather, the Museum *does not* have indoor eating facilities or food storage.

MUSEUM STORE: The Museum Store is available by request for purchases.

CANCELLATIONS: The Museum requires a one-week notice for all tour and outreach cancellations.

SPECIAL NEEDS: Please inform staff about special needs. All exhibits and restrooms are wheelchair accessible.



California Common Core State Standards: **Did You Know?**

School tours are based on the California Common Core State Standards (CCCSS) in a range of subjects including English Language Arts, History/Social Science, Science, and Visual Arts! The CCCSS builds strong content knowledge, model comprehension and critique, value evidence, and help students understand other perspectives and cultures. Our docent-led tours place an emphasis on analytical skills—observation, analysis, problem solving, collaborative group work, vocabulary building, hands-on art projects, and serve as examples of quality and effective presentations.



CORE EXHIBITS (On View Year Round)

Road Ways

Examine the impact of the road and highway on American life and culture. Highlights include Ontario's Euclid Avenue, Holt Boulevard and U.S. Route 66. Road Ways gives students the opportunities to focus on the U.S. and reflect on their city.

Gem of the Foothills

Discover the unique history of Ontario, its founding by the Chaffey bothers, its diverse residents, and organizations. Find out why it has been called both a "Model Colony" and the "Gem of the Foothills."

Water Conservation Landscape (Opens in Spring of 2017. Call Museum for exact dates.) Walk and learn about the Museum's new grant funded (\$1 Million Urban Greening Grant) water wise garden that highlights the landscape of the Tongva and the foundation of Ontario by the Chaffey brothers. Other topics of interest include the historic Frankish Fountain, water conservation and bioretention.
